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#### **Broadmoor Crime Prevention & Improvement District**

I hope everyone had a safe and happy holiday season. I loved all the beautiful decorations that make our neighborhood so festive!

For those of you new to the neighborhood, I am Marcelle M. DeSoto, the Chair of the Broadmoor Crime Prevention & Improvement District (BCPID), and I would like to tell you a little bit about our/your organization.

The commission of the BCPID is made up of residents of Broadmoor. None of the commissioners receive any compensation for their service. BCPID works in unison with our Broadmoor Residents' Association (BRA) on many of its projects.

All BCPID's meetings are public meetings and subject to public meeting rules and disclosures. The meetings are held at the Broadmoor United Methodist Church – Adult Education Building, corner of Sharp Road and Mollylea Drive. The first BCPID meeting of 2022 occurred on January 31<sup>st</sup>. For any further information and meeting times and dates, please visit our website at <u>www.bcpid.com</u>.

As stated in the name, BCPID's primary focus is crime prevention. BCPID's Private Police Patrol (PPP) currently employs 10 Baton Rouge City Police (including a police coordinator). These officers patrol our neighborhood on a proactive basis. They patrol, in both marked and unmarked vehicles seven days a week at varying hours. Because of the hard work of the PPP, our neighborhood's crime rate continues to be one of the lowest, per capita, in Baton Rouge. As always, residents should call 911 when they have an emergency.

BCPID is also working to install security cameras at the entrances of Broadmoor. We are working closely with the Baton Rouge Police Department to provide the best system for our neighborhood's security.

The second part of BCPID's name, "Improvement," is so that we can continue to enhance and beautify the neighborhood within the bounds of our by-laws. BCPID maintains the entrance signs, the flower beds and the Goodwood Boulevard banners. We also work with the Broadmoor Residents' Association on many projects to ensure that our neighborhood's beauty is preserved.

We are proud to report that the property values in Broadmoor continue to rise with the latest average price reported to be \$295,000. We hope our continued efforts contributed to this rise.

Finally, all the commissioners on BCPID appreciate the support that our neighbors give us in our efforts to maintain and improve the quality of Broadmoor and look forward to its future.

### **Broadmoor Middle School to Become an Arts Conservatory**

The East Baton Rouge Parish School Board approved a measure to re-open Broadmoor Middle School as an art school for students in grades six through twelve. Located at 1225 Sharp Road, Broadmoor Middle has been closed since 2019.

According to WAFB, the re-imagined school is projected to open for the 2023/2024 academic school year. WAFB provided the following comment from East Baton Rouge Parish school officials regarding the school:

"Placing this unique form of academic programming would enhance the district's current offerings within the portfolio of schools. A conservatory school would be the first of its kind in the metro area and afford families additional choice for educational opportunities of high-quality seats within our school system. In collaboration with the district's Fine Arts Department and Magnet Programs, the district intends to implement a priority zone that reflects a component of the previous and historical attendance zone for the former Broadmoor Middle School site. Specific details of attendance and proximity zones will be brought back for board approval at a later date."

As an arts conservatory, Broadmoor Middle School would provide intensive instruction in the arts, including music, film, dance, theater and visual arts. The re-opening of the facility is great news for the Broadmoor neighborhood and especially for families with school-age children.



#### **Amazon Update**

Work continues on the new Amazon robotics facility at the site previously home to Cortana Mall. The new building is projected to open in December of this year. Officials expect Amazon to begin hiring this summer in advance of that opening date. The Louisiana Department of Economic Development estimates that the project will create more than 1,000 full-time jobs and more than 1,100 indirect jobs. The project is a \$200 million investment. Once operational, site employees will package and distribute small customer orders.

#### **Real Estate Trends**

"The 2021 housing market was one for the history books." That's according to the December 2021 real estate report by the Greater Baton Rouge Association of Realtors<sup>®</sup> (GBRAR). The report quotes the National Association of REALTORS<sup>®</sup> as saying that, "after three consecutive months of increases recently, existing home sales are on pace to hit their highest level in 15 years, with an estimated 6 million homes sold in 2021."

Here in Baton Rouge, the GBRAR reported a decrease of 13.7% in new home listings and a pending sale increase of 5% in December. In addition, the group reports that inventory was down 50.7%. In terms of dollars, the GBRAR reports that the median sale price for homes in the region rose 7.5% to \$240,000 and homes spend an average of 37 days on the market.

More specific to Broadmoor, the website <u>neighborhoodscout.com</u> reports that the average home price in the neighborhood is more than \$200,000. As an established neighborhood with large lots and mature trees, Broadmoor is certainly an attractive option for potential buyers. In fact, the website <u>homesnacks.com</u> ranks Broadmoor number 30 on its list of top neighborhoods to call home in Baton Rouge.

Looking ahead to 2022, real estate experts predict the current trends to continue and potentially moderate some compared to 2021.
